From the Principal's desk

Jason Reid — July 25th, 2024

Nau mai, haere mai ki tā tātou pānui o Hūrae. Welcome to our July newsletter.

It's hard to believe we're already heading into the eighth month of the year. The weeks seem to be flying by, and while it might feel early, this term is packed with crucial tasks to prepare for the start of next year. We need to finalise enrolments for 2025, open applications for head students, recruit new staff, draft new subjects and timetables, and continue meeting with Year 8 students to ensure a smooth transition to 2025.

Currently, we have a host of exciting events in progress. A group of our students have just returned from a trip to China, arriving home safely despite the worldwide IT meltdown. Preparations for the Winter Tournament are in full swing, and we're starting a second term of CACTUS. Our seniors are gearing up for their final two terms of NCEA assessments, and the Talent Quest and Spirit Week are just around the corner. I look forward to sharing updates on these events and more in our August edition.

We've also experienced some staff changes recently. This week, we farewelled Ruth Robertson, who has taken on the role of Deputy Principal at Hornby High School. In a moving mihi whakatau and farewells, we expressed our deep appreciation for her contributions to Kaiapoi High School and Karanga Mai Young Parents' College. Ruth has left behind an incredible legacy. In her place, we've welcomed Whitney Richardson as the new Director of Karanga Mai. We had an outstanding pool of applicants, and Whitney's appointment reflects our enthusiasm and excitement for her vision and energy for the College. It is also with great sadness that I announce that we will be farewelling Whaea Danna mid-term. Her contribution to Kaiapoi High School and its students has been phenomenal. I will report more on that in our August edition, but in the meantime, please see Whaea Danna's farewell in this edition.

In our school assemblies this week, we addressed several important topics. With our junior students, we focused on evaluating the reliability of the information they receive. Students might come home and discuss with their whānau the information they've encountered as part of our initiative to encourage critical thinking. We're prompting students to pause, ask critical questions, and consult a trusted adult. Often, just the act of articulating the information can reveal its inaccuracies.

For our senior students, we discussed strategies for managing the stress associated with upcoming assessments. The key is to be proactive: plan out what needs to be done for the remainder of the year and talk about any concerns with those who can offer support. You might notice an increase in these conversations as students reach out to teachers and whānau for guidance.

Across both junior and senior assemblies, we emphasised the importance of taking care of each other and our school environment. Unfortunately, we've seen an unexpected rise in damage around the school recently. We're urging students to take positive actions to discourage or report such behaviour. These small incidents can lead to significant costs, diverting funds from essential school projects. Also, we are currently working on recovering these costs from any student responsible for the damage.

As we move into August, I wish you all the best and look forward to providing more updates in our next newsletter.

GATE is our Gifted and Talented Education programme.

Kia ora! My name is Callum Bell, and I am the coordinator for gifted and talented education here at Kaiapoi High School. In this role, I run a programme designed to foster the diverse range of gifts and talents we have at Kaiapoi High School; it currently consists of three initiatives:

1. A Google Classroom page which offers students extracurricular opportunities such as competitions, experience days and workshops. These opportunities are provided on an opt-in basis – students are only expected to engage in things they believe they will find personal value in; things that will foster their strengths or expand their horizons.

- 2. Occasional compulsory events such as guest speakers. Most recently, this was Jenni Adams, an astroparticle physicist and Rhodes Scholarship recipient who is an ex-student of Kaiapoi High School. Jenni talked to the students about her research, experience with scholarship applications, and the value she places on her education at Kaiapoi High School. Prior to this, we also hosted ex-head student and doctor Ezra Schofield, as well as Brendan Dooley an international award-winning comedy magician from Christchurch. Ezra taught the students not only about medicine as a profession and a study pathway, but also how to manage life balance, while Brendan spoke to the students of the importance of resilience and choice in the face of tough times.
- 3. Optional and informal gatherings in the library for hot drinks and biscuits to allow students to let off steam and discuss whatever is on their mind. This can include things like study tips, stress management, scholarships, how university works and more.

The programme has been designed so that it provides students with additional opportunities that address their needs in a way that doesn't take time or resources away from their wider school and life experiences. If you think your child would like to be involved in this programme, have a chat to them about it, and get them to come and see me in the Karetū deans' office!
